IUSB Honors Program Partners with RPN

The Honors Program at IUSB is the newest partner for the River Park Neighborhood Association. The Honors Seminar class has divided into groups to serve the River Park Neighborhood in various ways, including the food pantry, Potawatomi conservatory, creating a website for the neighborhood, working with youth, and revamping/digitizing the newsletter. The goal of the projects is to assist and support the community that IUSB resides in.

Honors Seminar Professor, Dr. Neovi Karakatsanis, spoke about the mutual benefits of the project. "The neighborhood would benefit from the work of our students who are writing stories for the neighborhood's newsletter, moving the newsletter to a digital platform, creating a website for the association, working on youth programming, and volunteering at the Conservatories and at the River Park Food Pantry. In exchange, our honors students are being enriched by these experiences. They are learning leadership and life skills that are sought by employers and graduate programs alike. In fact, they are building their resumes while building an even stronger community!"

Students are also instructed to identify a leadership project they can direct for each service area. My participation in the class involves collecting and writing stories for the newsletter. My personal goal is to provide a voice to each member of the River Park Neighborhood and provide information on events and opportunities within the community. 

Rediscover History: South Bend's Underground Railroad BY CHLOE GARNER

"Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it" Spanish Philosopher George Santayana.

Is this statement true? It is a popular quote within history and social studies classrooms around the US, used in arguments against teaching America's atrocities. But how does that apply to local history? Are those who are unfamiliar with Indiana, South Bend, and River Park history also doomed to repeat it? What can even be learned of such minute and seemingly uninfluential history as that of small-town Indiana? Yet, when taking a broader look into South Bend's rich history, it is obvious that many aspects have remained untouched. It's time to dust off the chest that harbors local history and rediscover the past of the city.

One piece of South Bend's history that deserves recognition is its participation in the Underground Railroad. Many citizens are unaware of the city's influence on the Underground Railroad, yet it played a role in its success. The law became aware of the Underground Railroad during an 1849 Court Case, later dubbed the Fugitive Slave Case. The Underground Railroad ran from the south up to Cass County, Michigan, with South Bend being one of the last stops along the way.

In the case, Freedom Seekers and abolitionists rallied together to defend a runaway slave from being returned to his owner in Kentucky. Though the owner won the case, he received financial compensation in lieu of the slave.

Key Underground Railroad conductors include South Bend citizens, James Washington, and another who is simply named Mr. Sawyer. These men were barbers who collected money to help protect and safely transport slaves across state lines to Cass County, Michigan. Washington's wife hosted a sewing circle to clothe and collect monetary donations for runaway slaves as well.

A documentary was filmed by South Bend's History Museum about the role of African Americans in South Bend's history. It may be watched on the museum's website under the title "A Free Life." The hyperlink for digital readers is here: https://www.historymuseumsb.org/free-life/

The US Census shows that about 25% of South Bend's population is African American, and the River Park Neighborhood's population is 12%. This number may be in part because of the influence and location of South Bend on the Underground Railroad.

So how can we learn from this information? Simply acknowledging the importance and struggle of African Americans in the neighborhood and city is a start. While you may not find yourself harboring slaves and transporting them to freedom and safety, you may find yourself witnessing other prejudices and racist events. Learning from past Freedom Seekers and abolitionists and knowing the importance of freedom and race equality to South Bend's ancestors, will leave you encouraged to fight for equality in current matters.

Let's not be doomed to repeat the secrecy of our abolition and anti-racism beliefs, but be open and ready to fight for justice and equality, with knowledge of South Bend's past call for freedom.

She describes her unique style as "Graffitism" and draws inspiration from urban art as well as different types of music. Through her work locally, Samara has cemented herself as a standout artist within the community. For its Book Choice of 2023, the library has chosen Mike Curato's *Flamer*. The book follows the story of a young boy named Aiden, who is struggling through the various aspects of adolescence. The book is unabashed in its portrayal of these struggles and doesn't shy away from their awkward nature. *Flamer* has also been praised for the voice it gives to those in the LGBTQ community, with Aiden himself coming to accept his own feelings throughout the book.



In his unique art style, Curato tells Aiden's story in such a way that those struggling with similar difficulties can relate. And through his writing, Curato creates a powerful portrayal of adolescence and the struggles that can come with being different. 
