Your VOTE is Your Voice – USE IT

Tuesday, November 7, 2023 is Election Day. Check your voting status at the Indiana Voter Portal. https://indianavoters.in.gov/ There you'll also find lists of your elected officials, who's on your ballot, list of Vote Centers, and more. Please ensure your friends and family are registered - and plan to vote.

If there is ANY chance you might not be able to vote on Election Day, VOTE EARLY Anything can happen at the last minute; don't take that chance, VOTE EARLY All registered Indiana voters are eligible to vote early in-person

Important Deadlines

Tuesday, October 10: Deadline to register to vote

Wednesday, October 11: Early Voting BEGINS. Bring your valid photo ID

Tuesday, November 7: Election Day, 6am to 6pm: At any Vote Center. Bring valid photo ID.

Register to Vote OR Check Your Voter Registration

Check your voter registration to ensure you have not been purged from the voter rolls:

- In person: Voter Registration (VR), County-City Building; Call with questions 574-235-9521.
- · Online 24/7: https://indianavoters.in.gov/

Vote Absentee: If you meet one of the approved excuses, go to indianavoters.com. Print an Absentee-by-Mail Application, or call VR to have one mailed to you. Complete and return in the envelope provided, or take to Clerk's Office by the deadline listed above. Your actual ballot will be mailed to you. Check the ballot to ensure you have the correct ballot AND that 2 sets of initials are on the back. Complete, sign, and return your ballot so it is received by the deadline listed above.

- **If you wish to return your ballot in person, take it to the County Clerk's Office**
- **Remember to allow several days for mail to be received and/or sent**

Request a visit from the Travel Board:If you are a voter who is confined or you care for a confined person. Complete an application for Absentee Ballot by Traveling Board, indianavoters.com, OR call 574-235-9101 or 574-235-9105 to request the Travel Board come to your home.

Vote in person Tuesday, November 7: 6am to 6pm, Bring your valid photo ID. Vote at any Vote Center. Vote Center locations will be publicized when finalized and indianavoters.com.





South Bend's Lead Challenge: History, Homes, and Health Joel Bell, LeadRx, Notre Dame Innovation Team

South Bend, Indiana, with its storied past and urban landscape, has a complex history that mirrors many American cities. Like its counterparts, homes here were constructed during an era when lead-based paints were commonplace. Until the U.S. ban in 1978, lead paints were a household standard. These older homes, while significant markers of the city's history, carry an unseen risk. When lead-based paints deteriorate or are disrupted, they pose serious health dangers, especially to vulnerable groups such as children and pregnant women.

Proactive Steps for Home Safety

The first step for South Bend residents is recognizing the potential presence of lead in their homes. If your dwelling dates back to before the 1978 ban, it's probable that lead-based paint was used in its construction.

The Notre Dame Lead Innovation Team, in response to this concern, offers free lead screening kits to the public. These are available at multiple public library locations throughout South Bend. If the screening raises alarms, homeowners are provided with resources and guidance on cost-effective methods to reduce lead exposure risks.

While the very thought of lead in homes can be unsettling, there are practical and affordable ways to mitigate its risks. A simple action, like adding a fresh coat of paint over old walls, can seal potential lead paints beneath, acting as a protective barrier. If you're pondering larger renovations, it's crucial to stay informed and cautious, given the risk of releasing lead particles. Additionally, for areas of concern outside the home, especially gardens or play spaces, adding mulch can be an effective method to shield against lead-contaminated soil.

Nutrition's Role in Combating Lead Effects

Proper nutrition can be a strong ally against the harmful effects of lead poisoning. Foods rich in calcium, like dairy products and green leafy vegetables, can counteract lead by reducing its absorption in the gut. Iron, found in foods such as red meats and beans, works in tandem with calcium by decreasing the absorption of lead. This effect is particularly pronounced when iron is consumed alongside vitamin C sources, like citrus fruits. Furthermore, vitamin C on its own might assist in lowering lead levels in the blood, making it imperative to include fruits like oranges, strawberries, and bell peppers in one's diet. When combined with regular handwashing and cleanliness, especially after outdoor activities or gardening, a well-balanced diet can substantially reduce the risks associated with lead.

The Notre Dame Lead Innovation Team stands as a testament to the power of collective effort.
