

Tuesday, May 7 is Indiana's Primary Election Day

We vote for county, state, and federal offices in our upcoming Primary Election, Tuesday, May 7. Winning candidates will then compete in the General Election on Tuesday, November 5.

Be sure to check your voter registration to ensure your name has not been purged, <u>indianavoters.com</u>. Also find your elected officials, who's on your ballot, list of Vote Centers, and much more. Please ensure your friends and family are registered to vote. **If there is any chance you will not be able to vote on Election Day, VOTE EARLY**

Important Dates. **VOTE AT ANY VOTE CENTER**

Monday, April 8: Voter Registration ENDS Tuesday, April 9: Early Voting BEGINS

Thursday, April 25: Deadline for County Clerk to receive Application for Absentee Ballot By Mail Monday, May 6, 12 noon: Early Voting ENDS, and Deadline for Clerk to receive completed Absentee Ballot By Mail

Tuesday, May 7: Primary Election Day, 6am to 6pm

Register to Vote OR Check Your Voter Registration

Check your voter registration to ensure you have not been purged from the voter rolls:

- In person: Voter Registration (VR), 4th floor, County-City Building; 574-235-9521. Call with Q's.
- Online 24/7: indianavoters.com

Vote Absentee: If you meet one of the approved excuses, <u>indianavoters.com</u>, print an Application for Absentee Ballot by Mail, or call VR to have one mailed to you. Complete and return in the envelope provided, or take to Clerk's Office by Thursday, April 25. Your actual ballot will be mailed to you. Check the ballot to ensure you have the correct ballot AND that 2 sets of initials are on the back. This is critical. If not, call VR immediately. Complete, sign, and return your ballot so it is received by Monday, May 6 at noon. **If you wish to return your ballot in person, take it to the County Clerk's Office**

Remember to allow several days for mail to be received and/or sent

Request a visit from the Travel Board: If you are a voter who is confined or you care for a confined person, complete Application for Absentee Ballot by Traveling Board, <u>indianavoters.com</u>, OR call Kim Riskovitch, 574-235-9635, ext. 7013, to request the Travel Board come to your home.

Vote in person Tuesday, November 7: 6am to 6pm, Bring your valid photo ID. Vote at any Vote Center. Vote Center locations will be publicized when finalized and at <u>indianavoters.com</u>.

River Park Safety Summit Reported by Kelly Wilson

The River Park Safety Summit was held on Monday, February 12, 2024 at the IU South Bend Grill. Representatives from the South Bend Police Department and the South Bend Fire Department gave a presentation on personal and home safety.

South Bend Police Department

Sgt. Jarveair Bourn and Officer Joseph Cole, both Community Resource Officers with the South Bend Police Department, let the attendees know that one of the main goals of their department is to develop a friendly and approachable relationship with residents. The officers attend neighborhood meetings, community events, host cookouts and answer phone calls. You won't have to go through 3 people to get to them. There are also traffic detail officers to serve traffic calls. The officers handed out magnets with direct contact numbers with the different departments within the SBPD. You can pick them up at the next River Park Neighborhood Association meeting on March 14th.

Personal Safety Tips:

Be aware of your surroundings; walk in pairs. Let someone know where you are. Stay off your phone to reduce distraction, and the same for ear buds. Carry a flashlight, not your phone flashlight which can provide a quick distraction. Sit in your car before getting out and scan the area. Keep your doors locked, and pay attention to who is around you as you walk to your destination. An alarm app on your phone is useful to communicate potential threats.

Home Safety Info

The Crime Registry Program is available to all SB residents. You can register your Ring or other camera with <u>syncsouthbend.org</u>. If a crime occurs in your area, the police can look at the footage of the time of the crime. They have 1,297 registered cameras. The Integrated Cameras program is for area business owners where the police can see crimes in real time.

Home Safety Tips:

Use outdoor motion lighting. Put lights on a timer in the house. Don't post online that you are on vacation-wait until after you get home. Ask police to do a safety check if you feel like something is wrong in your neighborhood. Know your neighbors.

Vehicle Safety Tips:

Stow away valuables. Don't have the mentality that "it won't happen to me". Don't start your car and leave it unattended.

Other Tips:

Mace or Pepper Spray are great for protection, but read the instructions. Test the device prior to carrying it so you know how to use it in an emergency. Wasp spray works well also.



Social Media:

Don't give out personal information, speak with the person first. A dog and/or an alarm system are equally effective in deterring a crime. Car Cams are helpful if you are involved in an accident.

Break up your daily routine. Look outside before walking out of your house. Be aware of dark or hidden areas outside your door where a person can hide. Use outside lighting. Check out the South Bend Transparency Hub for River Park crime statistics, city info, and more at

Firefighter Suzie Krill-Public Information Office, Fire Chief Carl Buchanon Home Fire Safety and Prevention Tips:

- Home address signs should have 3 inch numbers in colors that contrast with your home color so they stand out. This will assist the Fire Department in locating your home quickly and easily. Place them at eye level, or on your mailbox, and not on porch steps.
- Fire Chief Carl Buchanon emphasized the importance of getting out of the house before calling 911.
- Chief Buchanon also explained that fires that start on the first floor rise up.
- Have a flashlight next to your bed in case of fire to signal to firefighters where you are in the house.
- Have a home escape plan that all the occupants are aware of and have practiced. If you have a second story, purchase a ladder and practice attaching it and using it. If there is a fire outside your bedroom, stuff clothes or blankets under the door to delay the fire, and then go to the window.
- Talk to your neighbor about your plan so they can call 911 after you get out of the house.
- For stove fires-use the pan lid to put it out. Don't pick up the pan and put it in the sink.
- Don't leave the stove on when you leave the house. Don't leave food unattended in the air fryer or oven. If you do, set a timer on your phone to remind you to check the food.
- Home fire extinguishers are only for small fires, not for large fires. Check your extinguisher for the type each extinguisher has a description how it can be used.
- Smoke Alarms-Contact the SBFD for free smoke alarms and installation. Test them monthly. New alarms have 10-year batteries. Install one on every floor. In the basement the alarm should be placed above the stairs going down.
- The SBFD also recommends the use of Carbon Monoxide detectors, and offers to provide and install them.
- Pet safety stickers are available through the Fire Department to let first responders know there are pets in the home.
- Recycle paint and other flammable items so fires don't start in your garage or basement.
- Use surge protectors not extension cords in the home
- Don't leave kerosene or space heaters unattended.
- Have a certified electrician check out your wiring, not just someone who is "handy".
- The SB Fire Department offers CPR classes online.
